### About the MacLaren Art Centre

The MacLaren Art Centre is a free public art gallery located in downtown Barrie, Ontario. Our Permanent Collection is a major asset for the immediate and larger community. It comprises over 4,300 works of contemporary art, a substantial study collection, and an archive of vintage documentary photographs, most of which are designated as Cultural Property through the Department of Canadian Heritage. The Gallery serves an immediate community of 450,000 people across Simcoe County and central Ontario.

The Gallery receives funding from private donors, corporate sponsors, and ongoing public funding from the Ontario Arts Council, the Canada Council for the Arts, and the City of Barrie, as well as occasional project-based funding from the Government of Canada, Ontario Trillium Foundation, and the Ontario Attractions Fund. Other revenue is generated through events, memberships, and art programs.

#### Land Acknowledgement:

We acknowledge the traditional territory of the Anishinaabek, which include the Odawa, Ojibwe, and Pottawatomi Nations, collectively known as the Three Fires Confederacy. The local bands consist of the Chippewa Tri-Council, who are made up of Beausoleil First Nation, Georgina Island First Nation and Rama First Nation. We would also like to acknowledge the Wendat Nation (Huron) who occupied these lands prior to the middle of the 17th century. We also recognize the enduring presence of all First Nations, Métis and the Inuit peoples.



# Strategic Plan 2025-2030

Building on the strengths of the institution, the MacLaren Art Centre's new Strategic Plan sets out an ambitious path for the next five years, guided by a community consultation process in 2024.

With support from the Ontario Trillium Foundation in late 2023, the MacLaren Art Centre engaged the Osborne Group to lead a comprehensive strategic planning process. This initiative was guided by the leadership of a dedicated Steering Committee, with additional consultation from Workshop Architects and meaningful input from community members and individuals with deep knowledge of the MacLaren's history. The resulting plan is rooted in community engagement, institutional assessment, and regional context.

In 2024, the MacLaren Art Centre's exhibition schedule focused on building relationships with sister organizations in the province and beyond, to present a suite of exhibitions that foregrounded Indigenous voices, strengthened partnerships, and radically transformed the Gallery with new and exciting artworks.

### Winter

#### **Andrew Trudeau**

#### **Drawing Georgian Bay**

December 8, 2023 - March 31, 2024

Drawing Georgian Bay included works on paper by Andrew Trudeau (1924-2013) of handmade boats and scoots. The exhibition revealed his unique perspective on the world, informed by the knowledge of his Métis ancestors and 83-years of living off the land on the remote islands of Georgian Bay.

#### House for Sale

#### **Dmitry Gretsky and Eugenia Kats**

October 13, 2023 - January 14, 2024

House for Sale featured immersive work by the Innisfil-based artistic duo, who focus on the housing crisis in Ontario and related questions about migration, belonging, and concepts of home.

### Barry Ace, Catherine Blackburn and Justine Woods

February 16 - May 19, 2024

Indigenous artists Barry Ace, Catherine Blackburn and Justine Woods showcased their unique approaches to beadwork, with each stitch containing a gesture of love and rich histories shared across generations.



# Spring & Summer

#### Ron Shuebrook & Frances Thomas: In Conversation

#### June 14 - September 15, 2024

In Conversation celebrated two incredible artists' serious engagement with abstraction, finding commonalities and celebrating differences through practices that span decades. The exhibition and accompanying publication were co-produced with the Woodstock Art Gallery, where the exhibition began in 2023. It toured to the Art Gallery of Northumberland in 2024, and the Art Gallery of Algoma in 2025.

#### Joel Richardson and Nyle Miigizi Johnston

Gaganoonidiwag: They Talk To Each Other

June 14 - September 15, 2024 Curated by Virginia Eichhorn

This exhibition showcased a decade-long collaboration between artists Joel Richardson and Nyle Johnston, uniting Indigenous and settler perspectives through art, technology, and storytelling. Through their alter egos, Captain Jimmy Swann and Commander George Nadjiwon, the artists intertwined history and imagination in a multimedia exploration of reconciliation.



### Fall

#### **Derek Liddington**

Their horizon was mountain, their distance reveals

September 27 - November 8, 2024

Curated by Katie Lawson

Their horizon was mountain, their distance reveals transformed the MacLaren's Carnegie Room into an immersive environment through Derek Liddington's sweeping mural work and layered canvases. The exhibition explored ideas of fragmentation, embodiment, and the perceptual residue of art history. The artist invited viewers to move slowly, to attune themselves to shifts in perspective and to uncover the layered stories hidden beneath the painted surfaces.

This exhibition was a satellite presentation of **Seeds to Sow**, a temporary public art initiative organized by the City of Barrie and supported by the Barrie Public Art Committee, featuring six site-specific installations drawing on local ecologies, histories, and stories as acts of cultural planting and renewal. As part of this broader project, Liddington's exhibition brought these ideas indoors, offering a meditative, painterly counterpoint to the outward-facing works across Barrie's landscape.

#### Structural Integrity

#### Christine Howard Sandoval, Erdem Taşdelen, and Caroline Monnet September 27 - December 29, 2024

Curated by Noa Bronstein

Co-produced by the MacLaren and the Southern Alberta Art Gallery, *Structural Integrity* brought together works to examine architecture as a contested field of social meaning, where dominant narratives about space and value could be questioned or reimagined. The artists challenged the colonial underpinnings of the built environment while proposing more inclusive, multi-vocal understandings of place. A publication accompanied the exhibition, deepening its critical inquiry into how structures and materials shape, and are shaped by, the people that use them.

#### Jon Sasaki

#### Homage

September 27, 2024 - January 12, 2025

**Curated by Sarah Milroy** 

Touring from the McMichael Canadian Art Collection, *Homage* presented recent photographs by Jon Sasaki depicting bacterial cultures grown from swabs of artist tools once used by the Group of Seven and Tom Thomson. These enlarged images, displayed with the historical tools themselves, offered a darkly humorous and conceptually rich meditation on legacy and the Canadian landscape.


### Grace Note by Lyn Carter and Carl Taçon

The MacLaren's newest permanent sculpture by artists Lyn Carter and Carl Taçon, was unveiled in September 2024 in the Art Centre's main lobby, accompanied by a short documentary from LoveJoy Productions. Conceived before the pandemic and realized through years of collaboration and technical precision, *Grace Note* takes shape as a sweeping line of hand-bent, painted steel. Visible through the second-storey window, it draws the eye upward, enlivening the space with colour, motion, and optimism. Supported generously by Pratt Homes, Grace Note brings lift and delight to all who enter.

The companion exhibition, *Grace Note: a work in progress*, offered an intimate look at the sculpture's evolution from idea to installation. Featuring maquettes, schematics, material studies, and studio photographs, it revealed the craftsmanship and problem-solving behind the work. A full-scale scaffolding echoed the sculpture's ambition, inviting viewers to appreciate the unseen collaboration and ingenuity that shape public art.

ELEVATE! Lillian Place In collaboration with Redwood Park Communities

A collaborative project where twelve youth from the region created uplifting paintings with artist-mentor Leandra Almeida. Using colour and positive themes, their works bring warmth and hope to the great room at Lillian Place, a new housing development for families in crisis.

# Canvas for Change: Black Youth Art Celebration

Toronto-based artist Ashante Blackwood led workshops for regional Black youth ages 13 to 18, guiding them in developing ideas and personal expression. These sessions culminated in a vibrant exhibition and celebration.

## Culture Days 2024

As part of the annual nationwide Culture Days celebration, the MacLaren invites our community to engage with art through free programs, tours, and talks. Each year, we open our doors to celebrate creativity, connection, and the vital role of arts and culture in our region.

#### **Grace Note Celebrations**

To celebrate *Grace Note*, the MacLaren offered a suite of programing, including *All in Line*, a series of free community workshops that culminated in an exhibition of over 50 artworks. The celebration also featured *Animations*, a dance performance by Simcoe Contemporary Dancers and a three-part video series.

### VanGo

VanGo is the MacLaren's flagship arts education program, employing regional artists to bring high-quality visual art experiences to classrooms across Simcoe County, reaching over 7,000 students each year. Offered both virtually and in person, VanGo connects professional artists with students through hands-on workshops that spark creativity, build visual literacy, and integrate with Ontario's Arts Curriculum, as well as Geography, Science, and Social Studies.

Tailored for all grade levels, *VanGo* nurtures creative expression and critical thinking, from playful experimentation in Primary programs, to design principles and social context in Junior, to deeper conceptual engagement and reflection in Intermediate. Each workshop includes teacher resources and curriculum connections to ensure meaningful, cross-disciplinary learning.


